



RCB eye second crown, DC aim to break jinx as WPL set for thrilling finale

VADODARA, FEB 04: Royal Challengers Bengaluru skipper Smriti Mandhana will have the opportunity to lead her side to parity with Mumbai Indians in terms of success in the Women's Premier League, while Delhi Capitals will look to break their final jinx when the tournament's two most entertaining sides take on each other in the summit clash here on Thursday.

Former champions RCB have enjoyed a dream run this season, repeatedly showing the ability to step up and bounce back when the chips are down.

That resilience helped them create history by beginning their campaign with five consecutive wins, becoming the first WPL team to do so.

Adding to that, one or two players from within the group have consistently taken their game to the next level when required, a pattern that has emerged with monotonous regularity this season.

If Australian stalwart Grace Harris' blazing 75 against UP Warriorz in the previous match -- after a topsy-turvy season -- set the tone for an emphatic eight-wicket win, then little-known Gautami Naik's 73 against Gujarat Giants proved pivotal in a commanding 61-run victory for the 2024 champions, who will be aiming for a second title to draw level with Mumbai Indians.

Although RCB batters -- including Mandhana, Harris, Georgia Voll and Richa Ghosh -- have lacked consistency this season, isolated but timely contributions have proved decisive. Pace bowlers Nadine de Klerk and Sayali Satghare have delivered when it has mattered most.

South African Nadine de Klerk is currently the third-highest wicket-taker this season with 15 scalps from eight matches, including a best of 4 for 22, making her a potential game-changer in the final. Shreyanka Patil adds spin heft to the attack, a factor that was on full display in the decimation of Gujarat Giants, where she returned a five-wicket haul.

A well-rounded squad that can rise at crucial moments is the hallmark of Mandhana's side, and she will be hoping a few more players to step up in the title clash to see off the challenge from Delhi Capitals.

The Capitals, under new skipper Jemimah Rodrigues, are eager for a maiden title after finishing runners-up in all three previous editions of the WPL.

Delhi Capitals have relied on the strength of their formidable bowling lineup, with pacers Chinelle Henry and Nandani Sharma making their presence felt with the new ball.

Nandani, who could stake a claim for an India berth after taking 16 wickets this season to emerge the second-highest wicket-taker, has been the standout performer with several breakthrough spells.

On the batting front, Delhi Capitals' lineup has also begun to click. Lizelle Lee made a useful contribution at the top in the Eliminator against Gujarat Giants, while Shafali Verma managed to put her iffy form behind to forge a half-century partnership with the South African.

Reliable top-order batter Laura Wolvaardt has provided the stability the side needed throughout the season.

With both their batting and bowling heavily influenced by South African players, the Capitals have benefited from a tight-knit core that has played together for several years, fostering strong camaraderie and resilience in high-pressure situations.

That strong bond could prove crucial for Delhi Capitals as they aim to break their jinx and win the WPL title on their fourth attempt, guided by their new and charismatic skipper Rodrigues, who is poised for a big innings after a relatively subdued season.

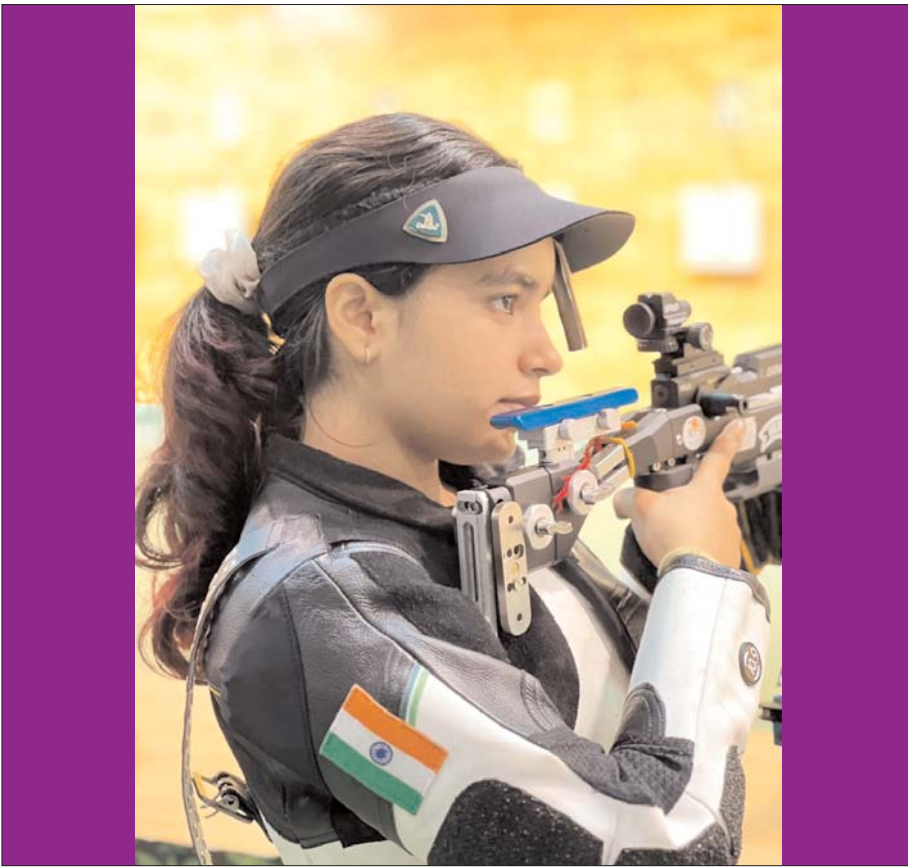
Aneesha wins Shooting Silver in Inter-University

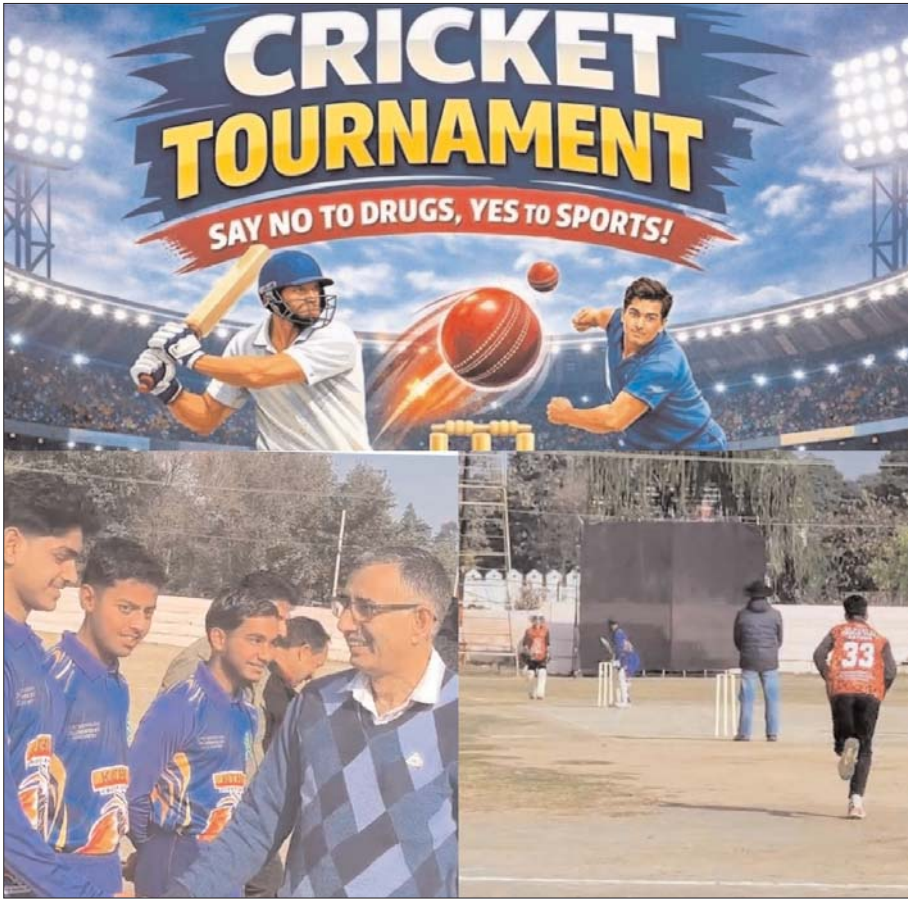
DC Kathua inaugurates Excise Department Cricket Tournament

U-19 World Cup: Aaron's classy hundred carries India to final

HARARE, FEB 04: Aaron George's silken hundred seamlessly merged with the explosive fifties from IPL stars Vaibhav Sooryavanshi and Ayush Mhatre to guide India to the ICC U19 World Cup final with a seven-wicket win over Afghanistan here on Wednesday.

India now face England in the summit clash here on Friday. It will be India's 10th final in the U19 showpiece, a testimony to BCCI's structured junior cricket programme that unearths serious talent.

India seemed to have a tough task ahead once Afghanistan piled 310 for four, built around hundreds by Faisal Shinozoda (110) and Uzairullah Niaza (101).

But India cantered past the target in 41.1 overs and it was also their highest-ever chase in the U19 World Cup. Aaron (115, 104b) led the chase with a hundred of impeccable pace and precision placements of his shots.

He received ample backing from Sooryavanshi (68, 33b) and Mhatre (62, 59b) as India kept their run-rate above seven all the while.

As is his wont, Sooryavanshi gave a flying start to India's innings with a flurry of boundaries, mainly off off-spinner Wahidullah Zadran.

There was a slice of fortune too when Niaza dropped the left-hander on 22 at point off Abdul Aziz.

But around that lapse, Sooryavanshi batted quite aggressively, even pulling off a stunning helicopter shot six off pacer Nooristani Omarzai.

There were repeated attempts to play pull shot in his innings, which eventually became his undoing - an aimless hoick off Omarzai ended in the hands of Osman Sadat inside the circle.

The opening wicket alliance stopped at 93, but Aaron then combined with Mhatre to add another 114 runs in just over 17 overs to take India past 200 in the 27th over.

Mhatre, who has been struggling for his rhythm in this tournament, made a fifty at the right moment, displaying his full selection of shots.

Once again, Aaron played the anchor's role to perfection as Mhatre took all the risks to keep his side much ahead of the asking rate.

Mhatre's dismissal did not deter Aaron, and he batted on composedly.

Apart from his unflappable



bility and situational awareness, the aesthetics of Aaron's batting was also impressive.

Not one shot was hit in anger, as the right-hander, who migrated from Kottayam, Kerala, to Hyderabad, batted with seldom-seen elan at this age of range-hitting.

His cover drives off Zadran and Roohullah Arab were a sight to behold, and even his lofted shots which fetched him sixes were bereft of stress.

Aaron went past his hundred in 95 balls with an exquisite tuck past mid-wicket for a four.

Aaron and Vihan Malhotra added 96 runs for the third wicket alliance as India sauntered to a win. However, Aaron could not stay long enough to see his side touch the tape.

Earlier, Shinozoda and Niaza led the way with magnificent hundreds as Afghanistan posted a challenging total.

Faisal top-scored with 110 off 93 balls, while Niaza

BATC 2026: Indian men and women register wins in group openers to seal quarterfinal spots

QINGDAO [CHINA], FEBRUARY 4 (ANI): Indian men overcame a strong challenge from Singapore, while the women dominated Myanmar in their opening group stage encounters to assure themselves of a quarterfinal spot in the Badminton Asia Team Championships being played in Qingdao, China, on Wednesday, according to a release.

The men's Group C clash between India and Singapore went down to the wire, with former world number 1 Kidambi Srikanth coming up with a clinical performance in the third men's singles against Jia Wei Joel Koh 21-15, 21-16 to ensure that the Indian men's team began their campaign with a win and assured themselves of

a last eight spot, as Singapore had lost their first group game against Japan 1-4.

India's campaign did not get off to the desired start, as Lakshya Sen went down 21-16, 19-21, 21-16 against former world champion Loh Kean Yew. But Satwiksairaj Rankireddy and Chirag Shetty resorted to parity with a 21-10, 21-8 win over Eng Keat Wesley Koh and Junsuke Kubo 21-10, 21-8 and Ayush Shetty then defeated Jia Heng Jason Teh 21-17, 21-15 to give India the lead.

The second doubles combination of Pruthvi Roy and K Sai Pratheek almost sealed the match for India as they easily won the opening game against Nge Joo Jie and Donovan Willand Wee before going

down 21-8, 21-23, 20-22. This meant that Srikanth had to find a way to beat Koh, and the experienced campaigner did that in style.

In the women's match, defending champions India did not break any sweat against Myanmar with world junior champion Tanvi Sharma opening the account with a 21-13, 21-16 win over Thet Htar Thuzar and then the team sweeping all remaining two singles and both the doubles matches.

They will now face Thailand in the second group game on Thursday to decide the group winner.
