You would be happy to know that we will soon be opening a new Consulate of India in Malaysia. This will bring us even closer," the Prime Minister said.

Reflecting on India's rapid transformation over the past decade, PM Modi added, "When we met in 2015, I spoke to you about India's potential. Now, I speak to you about India's performance. In one decade, India has seen a massive transformation. Then, we were the 11th largest economy in the world. Now, we are knocking on the doors of the Top 3. We are also the world's fastest-growing major economy."

He highlighted key achievements, including India becoming the world's second-largest mobile manufacturer, the significant growth of defence exports, India emerging as the third-largest startup hub globally, and the creation of the world's largest Digital Public Infrastructure and fintech ecosystem, with nearly half of the world's real-time digital transactions happening in India through the UPI platform.

He also noted India's commitment to clean energy, noting that solar capacity has increased 40-fold over the last decade.

Prime Minister Modi is on a two-day visit to Malaysia to further strengthen the India-Malaysia Comprehensive Strategic Partnership through enhanced cooperation in economic, digital, cultural, and people-to-people domains.

Enthusiasm of tourists to visit J&K hasn't diminished: Amit Shah

Secretary Govind Mohan, Chief Secretary Atal Dulloo and DGP Nalin Prabhat, among others, officials said.

Shah arrived here late Thursday night and kicked off his three-day visit to the region by touring the forward outposts of the Border Security Force (BSF) at Gurnam and Bobiyian along the International Border in Kathua district on Friday.

On his return from Kathua, he had chaired a security review meeting, which, among others, was attended by Army Chief General Upendra Dwivedi, with a focus on freeing J&K from terrorism.

The home minister also met the families of several policemen who had laid down their lives fighting terrorism and handed over job letters to them. A BJP delegation also called on the home minister on Friday.

"I held meetings in Jammu with the state office-bearers and MLAs and MPs of J&K BJP. The party will continue working to ensure the ground-level reach of PM Modi's development initiatives, while expanding the organisation to realise the vision of a developed Jammu and Kashmir, a secure Jammu and Kashmir," Shah posted on X after the meeting.

The home minister returned to Delhi on Saturday afternoon after the conclusion of the review meeting, officials said.

Responding to a question on whether the government intends to consider the persistent public demand for carving out a new Tehsil by bifurcating areas under Eidgah and North Tehsils, the Minister said that there is no such proposal presently under consideration in the department.

AN-32 Kargil courier service commences

Opposing these claims, Sonia Gandhi, in her reply, has maintained that the allegations are unfounded and that the petition is built on incorrect and misleading assertions.

Recently, the Sessions Court at Rouse Avenue had issued a notice to Sonia Gandhi while hearing the revision petition. The direction was passed by Sessions Judge Vishal Gogte after preliminary submissions were made on behalf of the revisionist.

Senior Advocate Pavan Narang, appearing for Vikas Tripathi, had argued that the material placed on record indicated serious irregularities in the manner her name was entered into the electoral roll before she became an Indian citizen. He submitted that certain documents may have been forged or falsified to secure her inclusion in the 1980 rolls and pointed out that her name was later deleted and then re-entered in 1983 on the basis of an application filed in January 1983.

He further argued that under the Representation of the People Act, only an Indian citizen can be enrolled as a voter, and therefore, the entries require judicial scrutiny. He also stated that while the initial complaint relied on an article containing clips of electoral rolls, the revisionist has since obtained attested copies from the Election Commission of India and placed them on record to support the allegations.

The revision petition stems from Tripathi's earlier complaint, which was dismissed by the Magistrate at the threshold on the ground that it lacked legal foundation and relied on uncertified photocopies of electoral records. The Magistrate had also observed that issues relating to citizenship and electoral rolls fall within the jurisdiction of the Central Government and the Election Commission of India and cannot be adjudicated through a criminal complaint.

NC, BJP MLAs clash in assembly over 'special status'

Referring to sloganising by an NC MLA in the House, Sharma asked where such a status exists in the Constitution.

The BJP leader accused the Abdullah family of deceiving the people of Kashmir and using the demand for 'special status' to cover up governance failures. He alleged that the issue was being raised to legitimise past electoral promises.

Speaking after inaugurating the three-day divisional-level Bastar Pandur festival in Jagdalpur, the headquarters of Bastar district, the President appealed to those who have renounced violence and joined the mainstream to trust the Constitution and democracy and not be misled by those seeking to divert them from the path of peace.

"Bastar's natural beauty and rich cultural traditions have always attracted people, but the region unfortunately suffered for years due to the menace of Maoism," the President said.

Noting that Naxalism caused the maximum damage to youth, tribals and Dalits, Ms. Murmu said that people associated with Maoist activities are now shunning violence, leading to the return of peace in the region.

"Government of India's decisive action against Maoists resulted in bringing an end to the atmosphere of fear and distrust", she added.

The President said she had been informed that a large number of Naxalites have surrendered and that the government is ensuring those who return to the mainstream are able to lead a normal and dignified life.

"With the government's efforts and the cooperation of the people, a new dawn of development is rising in Bastar," Ms. Murmu said.

She urged people to have faith in the system and move forward with hard work and dedication, describing democracy as a source of strength.

"I appeal to those who have renounced violence and joined the mainstream to have faith in the Constitution and democracy, and not be misled by those who seek to divert them," the President added.

Referring to her own journey to the top Constitutional post, Ms. Murmu said it reflected the strength of Indian democracy that a daughter from a small village in Odisha was today addressing you as President.

"You have even greater courage and strength. The government is dedicated to you," she said.

India reiterates stance on import of Russian oil

In a press briefing later in the day, Union minister Piyush Goyal assured that the India-US trade deal framework will not harm Indian farmers, MSMEs, artisans, or craftsmen, and said their interests remain fully protected.

"I can say with absolute certainty that the farmers, MSMEs, artisans, and craftsmen of India will not suffer for any kind of loss," Goyal said.

When asked whether India will stop purchasing Russian oil, as mentioned in a White House statement announcing the elimination of the additional tariffs imposed on India for the purchase, Piyush Goyal had said, "MEA will give information about it."

After announcing the interim framework between the United States and India trade agreement, the White House had said, "India has committed to stop directly or indirectly importing Russian Federation oil, has represented that it will purchase United States energy products from the United States, and has recently committed to a framework with the United States to expand defense cooperation over the next 10 years."

Cong alleges Indo-US trade pact 'betrayal' with India

Commerce Minister Piyush Goyal announced that India has not given any duty concessions on any dairy product and claimed that several Indian goods, including agricultural products, will attract zero reciprocal tariff in the US.

India and the US announced on Saturday that they have reached a framework for an interim trade agreement, under which both sides will reduce import duties on a number of goods to boost the two-way trade.

Khera said this is not a pact with the US, but a "compromise with our self-esteem and the interests of our farmers, MSMEs, and the middle-class".

Noting that India has become a dumping ground for the US, and it has happened under Modi's rule, he said, "With this deal, the back of farmers would be broken further, and the coming days will prove how farming in the country would be destroyed due to this deal."

Taking a swipe at the Bharatiya Janata Party-led government, Khera said it now works according to the US time, alleging that all decisions, whether on announcing a ceasefire of military conflicts or a trade deal, are taken in the US.

He said the trade deal was signed between India and the US without Goyal even travelling abroad.

"The government is functioning in accordance with the American time zone, and there cannot be anything more regrettable than this. A deal is between two partners sitting across the table and not due to blackmail."

"That is called surrender. The name is Narendra, the work is surrender. This deal has once again proved this," Khera said, alleging that Modi has "surrendered" before the US.

He said the Congress does not feel good when the prime minister "surrenders" before any other country, as "it is unfortunate".

Khera alleged that this was not the first time that Modi was seen "surrendering" India's interests before other countries.

"You have seen Narendra Modi giving clean chits to China. Now, we have gone and announced that we will buy products worth USD 500 billion over the next five years from the US. There is no corresponding commitment from the US."

"Your import bill with the US, from USD 40-42 billion a year, will have to go up to USD 100 billion a year. You know about the health of the rupee and the health of the economy. Where are you getting the money from, and what are the products you will buy? Piyush Goyal read out from the list of products that we will not buy. But he, very conveniently and cleverly, hid the list of what all will come and what all will be dumped," the Congress leader said.

He said earlier, India used to hold talks with the US and other countries, looking them in the eye.

According to a joint statement, India has expressed its intention to purchase US energy products, aircraft and aircraft parts, precious metals, technology products, and coking coal worth USD 500 billion over the next five years.

Goyal said the interim pact will open a USD 30 trillion market for Indian exporters, especially for micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSMEs), farmers, and fishermen, as the US duties on Indian goods will come down to 18 per cent.

Congress general secretary Jairam Ramesh alleged that Goyal's defence of the India-US trade deal from the point of view of Indian farmers is "too clever by half".

He said the joint India-US statement has something called "additional products" that are not specified.

"This is far too open-ended and shows something is being hidden. It says India has agreed to address long-standing barriers to the trade in US food and agricultural products. What does this mean if not the removal of restrictions on GM crops and dairy products? There will undoubtedly be more concerns as fuller details are revealed," Ramesh said in a post on X.
